

### **LINK WA ADVANTAGES**

- Link WA functions as WA's key freight and logistics corridor for local, regional, national and international freight movements.
- Containing six industrial areas, the Perth Airport, two freight rail intermodals, access to Fremantle harbour, and has State Government commitment to improve road, rail and port infrastructure.
- Link WA's share of employment in the Freight and Logistics Industry sits at 18.5% of all employment in Link WA
  compared to 7% for the State. This is evidence to the strength of the sector and its proximity to established
  employment pools.

## **ENHANCING LINK WA**

The role of the Link WA Alliance is to build upon the existing advantages of the Link WA Region.

Collaborative resources from the member Councils are invested into advancing five key objectives:

- Support Industry by standardising regulation, improving process and streamlining approvals
- Engage Industry to resolve challenges and embrace opportunities
- Conduct Research and build evidence to market our six industrial areas and their competitive advantages
- Communicate and Advocate on behalf of industry and support industry marketing efforts

Collaborative examples of work towards these objectives include:

#### Standardised land use planning

 Simplifying regulations across the Link WA Region by standardised development regulations relating to parking and land uses.

#### Research on common user facilities

Providing useful research for industry and meaningful connections, Curtin University students undertook research
into common user facilities in the Link WA Region, such as weighbridges, distribution centres and truck wash
facilities.

## **WHY LINK WA**

Link WA has been formally recognised as a key stakeholder in the freight and logistics ecosystem. As an Alliance of local governments that share a common vision, Link WA has been invited to participate in forums such as the Freight and Logistics Council of WA, Western Roads Federation and the Westport Local Government Reference Group. The Alliance prides itself on being an advocate for the region and aims to bring local and industry context, issues and concerns to these discussions.
